Some History

The Clean Water Act

- Passed in 1972 amid rampant pollution to our waterways
- It regulates discharges under the National Pollutant Discharge Elimination System (NPDES Permits)
- In 1999, large Municipal Separate Storm Sewer Systems (MS4) required to obtain a NPDES permit
 - Indianapolis was the only city in Indiana in this category
- In 2003, smaller municipalities such as Monroe County were required to obtain a NPDES permit as well

Why Do I Pay The Fee?!

- As an MS4, Monroe County has regulatory requirements under the Clean Water Act, but these are unfunded mandates.
 - The stormwater fee funds this program.
- The stormwater program results in better road drainage, cleaner water, and reduced flooding. Everyone benefits from these public goods.
- Each property owner is charged a fee because every property has runoff that contributes to downstream flooding or pollution.

How is the Fee Assessed?


- The fee is assessed based on impervious surface (driveways, rooftops, etc.) that limit water infiltration into the ground.
- Residential parcels (and agricultural parcels with a home) have an average of 5200 square feet of impervious surface, and are charged a flat fee of \$35.16 a year.
- Other (non-residential) parcels are individually measured using GIS mapping technology to determine their impervious surface and then their fee.

Non-residential Fee Calculations

1) Impervious surface is measured

2) Divided by 5200

3) Then multiplied by \$35.16



Common Questions

Will it reduce my stormwater fee if I combine parcels? Yes, but only if the parcel still remains in a property classification of 1-2 family home.

If I am a church or non-profit, why am I not exempt and how is my fee calculated?

If a parcel has impervious surface, it is not exempt from the stormwater fee. Even properties owned by the U.S. government are billed. The fee is calculated using impervious surface measurements.

More Common Questions

How does the stormwater fee benefit me? There are no ditches near my house, why do I have to pay?

The stormwater program results in better road drainage, cleaner water, and reduced flooding for all county residents. Everyone benefits from these public goods.

Why is it only county residents?

The city of Bloomington assesses its own stormwater fee, as well as the town of Ellettsville.
