Novel Coronavirus CASES -

Cases of novel coronavirus or COVID-19 in Indiana have increased by over 1200 since Tuesday, 3/31/20. This is likely due to both increased testing as well as transmission. During the same time period, COVID-19 related deaths more than doubled and went from 49 to 102.

CDC states that preliminary evidence from a study in Singapore shows that people infected
with COVID-19 can transmit the disease 1-3 days before the onset of symptoms. They
recommend public health departments expand contact tracing to include the period of time
before symptoms start to account for asymptomatic transmission. CDC stated this finding also
strongly supports the importance of social distancing in stopping the spread of the novel

- The Indiana State Department of Health Coronavirus Dashboard has added new metrics. In addition to the number of positive cases and deaths available at state and county levels and general demographics, the Dashboard has added:
 - o Number of COVID-19 tests completed at state and county levels
 - o Trend lines for cases, number of tests and deaths
- ISDH has expanded its high risk population for prioritizing limited COVID-19 testing to include people who have symptoms compatible with COVID-19 and:
 - Need hospitalization with acute respiratory illness
 - o Work in healthcare or as first responders
 - o Are pregnant
 - o Are 65 years of age or older
 - Live or provide direct patient care in a long-term care facility and have no known COVID-19 contact
 - o Are experiencing homelessness with no known COVID-19 contact
 - o People who die with suspected COVID-19 symptoms
 - Are an inmate or staff member (with direct inmate contact) with no known COVID-19 contact
 - Are patients with certain underlying conditions, such as chronic lung disease, heart disease with complications, immunocompromised, severe obesity, uncontrolled diabetes, renal failure or liver disease
- Smart 911 People who have been diagnosed or have symptoms of COVID-19 can help protect emergency care workers by signing up for Smart911. Smart911 is an app that allows people to input personal and medical information that helps first responders prepare when responding to a call to their residence.

 - o Certain medical students and graduates
